Pastor's Comments:

Brian Jones and Bertrand Picard were the first people to fly around the world in a hot air balloon. They won a prize of \$1 million. PASTORS COLUMN: THE NEW ARIANISM: ANNULMENTS Part IV

Okay, class, let's review. What was the *old* Arianism? Right. It was the rejection of the full divinity of Christ by the priest Arius and his followers in the 4rth century.

What is the *new* Arianism? I say that it is the rejection of standard Judeo-Christian sexual and marriage morality.

Like the first heresy, this one too is very popular and

politically correct. It involves approval of co-habitation, divorce and second marriage, same-sex marriage, and allowing people in those states to receive communion.

Last week I wrote that people in those states cannot receive communion until they remove themselves from those sinful situations, get to confession, and start all over again. With repentance, God is happy to forgive. Those in a second marriage are in that state, since Christ said, in so many words, once married, always married. He actually said that people who divorce and enter into a second marriage commit adultery.

Along those lines, many Catholics don't realize that they are also obligated to get married in the Catholic Church. For a Catholic to get married before a government official or a Protestant minister, without Catholic Church permission (which can be obtained in some cases) is serious sin and, again, bars one from communion.

That's because, over the centuries the Church has set rules for the regulation of matrimony among its members. She was given that power from Christ who said "whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven." (Matt. 16:18) Christ here says to the Church, whatever you need to do to keep good order is okay by me. And good order requires that the priest normally be the chief witness at every Catholic wedding, so we know who is married and who isn't

In any case, after a valid first marriage, more and more Catholics are divorcing. If such a divorced Catholic remains single – does not marry nor co-habit with someone- then that Catholic can continue receiving communion, believe it or not. After all, the Catholic Church considers divorce a civil fiction and the individual can still be considered married to the first spouse – just sort of separated. St. Paul says in 1 Cor. 7: 11 that if a wife does separate "let her remain single or else be reconciled to her husband." So separation is allowed, if one remains single.

The problem arises with a second marriage after divorce from a first one. The Catholic Church, of course, won't perform someone's second marriage, so the Catholic and the partner go to a J.P., or a Protestant minister for the ceremony. That is called an invalid marriage, because the previous marriage presents an obstacle to a true marriage.

Since Christ's words against divorce and remarriage are so strong, the Catholic Church does hold Protestants to those words as well. So a single Catholic engaged to a divorced Protestant cannot get married in the Catholic Church, because the Protestant has been married before and is still considered bound to that first marriage.

This is true even if the Protestant and his or her first spouse were married before a justice of the peace! That's because the Catholic Church respects whatever form or ritual that the Protestant churches respect for marriage. The Protestant churches respect J.P. weddings as true and valid and therefore so does the Catholic Church for Protestants (although not for Catholics). A J.P. marriage between two Protestants is considered by the Catholic Church as permanent and forever.

For those divorced from an ostensibly valid marriage, is there any recourse if they want marriage again, without incurring mortal sin? They must prove their first marriage invalid, i.e., not a true marriage as intended by God, even though vows were exchanged in church, even though there might be some years in the marriage and children produced. This is called a declaration of nullity or an annulment.

There are civil annulments given too, although they are rare. This is different from divorce, which is the break-up of an already existing marriage. With a civil annulment a court recognizes that a true marriage did not happen in the first place, even though vows were exchanged. Maybe one of the partners was forced into the wedding. Maybe one of the partners was underage. Maybe one or both were drunk.

Does anybody remember Britany Spears' first "marriage" years ago in Las Vegas? While partying hearty and soaring high, she and some young man thought it would be funny to go to a wedding chapel and just get married for the heck of it, which they did. It was later annulled by a civil court

We'll have more on annulments later.
